Pharmacy context

This is a community pharmacy located in the village of Timsbury near Bath. It serves its local population which is mostly elderly and affluent. The pharmacy opens six days a week. The pharmacy sells a range of over-the-counter medicines, dispenses NHS prescriptions and supplies medicines in multi-compartment medicine devices for people to use living in their own homes.

Principle 1 - Governance ✓ Standards met

Summary findings

The pharmacy has written procedures to help make sure the team works safely. Pharmacy team members record and review some mistakes that happen and use this information and learning to avoid future mistakes. But a more consistent and thorough approach could be taken by the pharmacy team to investigate dispensing errors to ensure that learning opportunities are not missed. Pharmacy team members are clear about their roles and responsibilities. The pharmacy asks its customers and staff for their views and uses this to help improve services. It generally manages and protects people's confidential information and it tells people how their private information will be used. The pharmacy has appropriate insurance to protect people when things do go wrong.

Inspector's evidence

Processes were in place for identifying and managing risks. There was a near miss log in the main dispensary which was seen to be used to record near miss incidents regularly. But there was only one example recorded in October. The pharmacist reported that this was reviewed regularly and any learning points were analysed and discussed. There was a poster in the dispensary warning staff to look out for medicines with similar sounding names and packaging. 'Sound alike' and 'look alike' medicines such as amitriptyline and amlodipine had been separated on the dispensary shelf.

There was a procedure in place to learn from dispensing errors. Dispensing errors were recorded and these were demonstrated to the inspector. These were also reported to the superintendent pharmacist. There were some dispensing incidents that did not have a robust root cause analysis recorded and so some learning opportunities could be missed.

There was an established workflow in the pharmacy where labelling, dispensing and checking activities were carried out at dedicated areas of the work benches. The team used stackable containers to hold dispensed medicines to prevent the mixing up different prescriptions. Dispensing labels were also seen to have been signed by two different people indicating who had dispensed and who had checked a prescription.

Standard operating procedures (SOPs) were in place for the services provided and these were regularly reviewed and signed by staff. The pharmacy team understood what their roles and responsibilities were when questioned.

There was a complaints procedure in place and staff were all clear on the processes they should follow if they received a complaint. The pharmacy carried out a Community Pharmacy Patient Questionnaire annually as part of their NHS contract. A certificate of public liability and indemnity insurance from NPA was displayed and was valid and in date until the end of April 2020.

Records of controlled drugs (CD) and patient returned controlled drugs were retained. A sample of a random CD was checked for record accuracy and the balance was correct at the time of the inspection. The CD balance was checked regularly. There were out of date CDs that had been separated from regular CD stock and labelled appropriately.

The responsible pharmacist (RP) record was retained. The time that the pharmacist ceased

responsibility was occasionally omitted. The RP notice was displayed but could not easily be seen from the retail area of the pharmacy. The pharmacist agreed to address this. There was one fridge in use and temperatures were recorded daily and were within the appropriate temperature range of two to eight degrees Celsius. Date checking was carried out regularly and a date checking matrix was displayed in the dispensary. Short dated stock was highlighted. The private prescription and specials records were retained and were in order. The emergency supply records were not always retained in the pharmacy as the pharmacist had only been recording these on 'PharmOutcomes'. The pharmacist agreed to address this.

The pharmacy team were seen to be following the company's information governance procedures during the inspection. The computer screens were all facing away from the public and were password protected. Confidential waste was regularly shredded by staff using a cross cut shredder.

The pharmacy team had been trained on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults. On questioning, staff were clear about how they may identify and refer safeguarding concerns appropriately. Contact details for local safeguarding advice, referral and support were not immediately available at the time of the inspection and the pharmacist agreed to address this.

Principle 2 - Staffing ✓ Good practice

Summary findings

The pharmacy staff have the appropriate skills, qualifications and training to deliver services safely and effectively. The pharmacy team members work well together. They are comfortable about providing feedback and raising concerns and are involved in improving pharmacy services.

Inspector's evidence

There was one pharmacist and two dispensing assistants present during the inspection. They were all seen to be working well together. Staffing levels were seen to be sufficient for the level of the services provided during the inspection.

Staff performance was monitored and reviewed annually. In these reviews, staff performance and development would be discussed. Staff would also be given the opportunity to give feedback.

The staff reported that they kept their knowledge up to date by reading third party materials and would ask the pharmacist if they had any queries. The pharmacist used the 'Virtual Outcomes' training platform and demonstrated that staff had been trained on a range of topics including antimicrobial resistance and safeguarding children and vulnerable adults. The pharmacist would then direct staff to write down what they had learnt from the training. Training was documented and demonstrated to the inspector. Staff reported that they received adequate time to complete their training. Staff meetings would take place on an ad-hoc basis where any significant errors, learning and business issues would be discussed with the team.

Staff reported that they felt comfortable to approach the superintendent pharmacist with any issues regarding service provision. There were no formalised targets in place in the pharmacy.

Principle 3 - Premises ✓ Standards met

Summary findings

The pharmacy provides a safe and appropriate environment for the provision of pharmacy services. The pharmacy team protect private information and the pharmacy is secure and protected from unauthorised access.

Inspector's evidence

The pharmacy had retail area toward the front and a dispensary area toward the back separated by a medicines counter to allow for the preparation of prescriptions in private. There was minor damage to some ceiling tiles in the dispensary. There was a sink available in the dispensary with running water to allow for hand washing and preparation of medicines. Medicines were stored in shelves and drawers in a generic and alphabetical manner.

There was one small consultation in use. It was clean, tidy and professionally presented. There were lockable drawers for storing patient confidential information. The ambient temperature was suitable for the storage of medicines. The lighting throughout the store was appropriate for the delivery of pharmacy services.

Principle 4 - Services ✓ Standards met

Summary findings

The pharmacy's services are accessible, effectively managed and delivered safely. The pharmacy obtains, stores and manages medicines safely and ensure that all of the medicines it supplies are fit for purpose. The pharmacy team take appropriate action where a medicine is not fit for purpose.

Inspector's evidence

Access to the pharmacy was step free. There was seating for patients or customers waiting for services. There was a range of leaflets and posters available to the public about services on offer in the pharmacy.

The pharmacy team dispensed multi-compartment compliance aids for around 35 patients for use in their own homes. The compliance aids were dispensed at the back of the dispensary to try and reduce distractions to staff. One compliance aid was examined and an audit trail to demonstrate who dispensed and checked it was complete. Descriptions were provided for the medicines contained within the compliance aids. Patient information leaflets (PILs) were regularly supplied.

The pharmacy team had been offering the flu vaccination service since September and had completed around 150 vaccinations at the time of the inspection. Staff explained how this service had increased accessibility to patients who find it difficult to attend limited GP appointments. The pharmacist had completed recent anaphylaxis and resuscitation training. The patient group direction (PGD) was examined and was valid and in date.

The pharmacy team had an awareness of the strengthened warnings and measures to prevent against valproate exposure during pregnancy. Valproate patient cards were available for use during valproate dispensing to all female patients. The pharmacist reported that she would check that the patient's prescriber had discussed the risks of exposure in pregnancy with them and they are aware of these and query if they were taking effective contraception.

The pharmacy obtained medicinal stock from suppliers such as AAH, Alliance and Phoenix. Specials were ordered from suppliers such as B&S Colorama. The superintendent pharmacist was aware of the European Falsified Medicines Directive (FMD). She explained that she had the scanning equipment and was in the process of rolling out software, relevant SOPs and staff training.

There were destruction kits for the destruction of controlled drugs and designed bins for storing waste medicines were available and seen as being used for the disposal of medicines returned by patients. A bin for the disposal of hazardous waste medicines was not available during the inspection and the pharmacist agreed to address this.

Medicines and medical devices were stored in an organised fashion within their original manufacturer's packaging. Pharmaceutical stock was subject to date checks which were documented and up to date. The fridge was in good working order and the stock inside was stored in an orderly manner. MHRA alerts came to the team electronically through their email system. Records to demonstrate this were held and audit trails were kept.

Principle 5 - Equipment and facilities ✓ Standards met

Summary findings

The pharmacy has the appropriate equipment and facilities to provide the services offered. The pharmacy uses its facilities to protect patient privacy.

Inspector's evidence

There was a satisfactory range of crown stamped measures available for use. Amber medicines bottles were seen to be capped when stored and there was a counting triangle. Electrical equipment appeared to be in good working order and was PAT tested annually. Pharmacy equipment was seen to be stored securely from public access.

Up-to-date reference sources were available in the dispensary and included a BNF, a BNF for Children and a Drug Tariff. Internet access was also available should the staff require further information sources. There was one fridge use for the storage of thermolabile medicines which was in good working order and the maximum and minimum temperatures were recorded daily and were seen to always be within the correct range. Designed bins for storing waste medicines were available for use and there was sufficient storage for medicines. The computers were all password protected and patient information was safeguarded.
